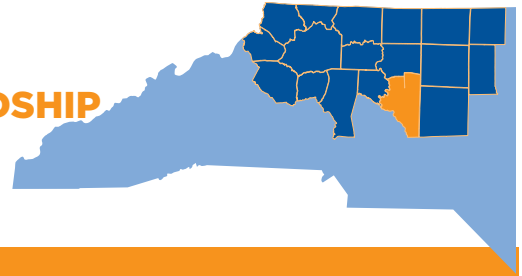
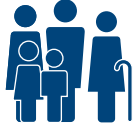

are food insecure



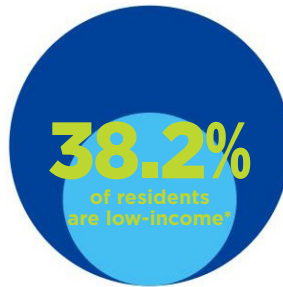

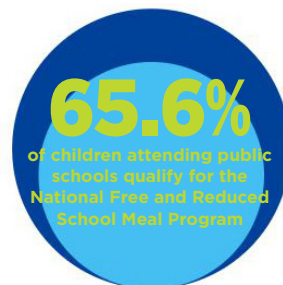

We also believe that a vibrant, resilient and thriving community requires that we challenge ourselves and others to deeper levels of conversation and action. In FY 2015-2016, Second Harvest Food Bank of Northwest NC's **local partners in DAVIDSON COUNTY** received:

Nearly 2.2 million meals → 2.6 million lbs. of food
saving \$4,233,679 in food acquisition costs.

FEEDING CAPACITY

39 local partners providing assistance for community members of Davidson County **count on Second Harvest Food Bank for food for their programs** that include food pantries, community soup kitchens, shelters and special meal programs for children and seniors.

→ **90%** say that not having access to Second Harvest Food Bank as a resource for food would have a major effect on their ability to serve their community.

Additional services provided by Second Harvest Food Bank for local partners include micro grants; nutrition education services for program staff and community members experiencing food insecurity; staffing support and training in Food and Nutrition Services (food stamp) outreach; information and tools to serve as effective advocates for hunger-free communities and on-going networking forums.

FEEDING FUTURES

A host of studies reinforce the importance of good nutrition early in life for brain development, learning and even success over a lifetime. Together with our local partners, schools and financial supporters, Second Harvest Food Bank provides **nutritious food for children when they need it most**: after school, over weekends and school holidays, and in the summer through Kids Cafes, School Pantries, Weekend BackPacks and special summer meal programs.

FEEDING HEALTH

We know that when household resources are limited, quantity often trumps quality when it comes to choosing what foods to buy. We also know that people experiencing food insecurity are disproportionately affected by diet-related diseases, such as Type 2 diabetes and hypertension. **Among those seeking food assistance from Second Harvest Food Bank's partner agencies in Davidson County:**

55% of households have at least one member with high blood pressure **37%** of households have at least one member with diabetes

In light of this knowledge, **Second Harvest Food Bank strives to do more than simply provide calories.** We are committed to:

- Increasing access to healthy food options for people experiencing food insecurity.
- Building the capacity of our local partners to store and provide fresh foods.
- Promoting good nutrition through classes and workshops that build knowledge and skills around shopping and cooking healthy on a budget.
- Providing assistance, training and informational materials to our local partners to assist potentially eligible community members with the Food and Nutrition Services (formerly Food Stamps) application process. (Food and Nutrition Services can provide additional nutritional support for Davidson County's most vulnerable families and also work to lift the local economy. It is estimated that every \$5 of FNS assistance spent generates \$9 in economic activity.)
